Born in 1850, Stevenson was famous as the author of <i>Treasure Island</i> , <i>Kidnapped</i>	3

Stevenson attended Edinburgh University and qualified as a lawyer, he	6
never practised law. During his time at university he became intrested in socialist	7

He was often ill as a child and suffered from tuberculosis, so he spent most of his	10
life travelling abroad to healthier climates. These travels inspired him to write	11
about his time spent canoeing and riding donkeys in France. He later travelled	12
by sea to America and continued his travels across the South Pacific; the scenery	13
of this foreign land gave him the for his first novel, <i>Treasure Island</i> .	14

The novel described a search for buried treasure and the battle of good (in the	16
form of a boy, Jim, and his friends) against evil (personified by the one-legged	17
pirate, Long John Silver).	18

The theme of good and evil continued in his next novel, <i>The Strange Case of Dr</i>	20
<i>Jekyll and Mr Hyde</i> , where Dr Jekyll discovers a drug that transforms him into the	21
evil monster, Mr Hyde.	22

Stevenson went on to write stories about the struggles of the Scottish people and	24
his novel <i>Kidnapped</i> was published in 1886, followed by <i>The Black Arrow</i> and <i>The</i>	25
<i>Master of Ballantrae</i> , both published in 1888.	26

He finally settled in Samoa, where he died in 1894. Stevenson was greatly	28
admired by his contemporaries and has been an inspiration for many writers. His	29
books are still popular today and have been translated into several languages	30

The Legend of King Arthur

The legends of King Arthur began to appear in the twelfth century and it is possible they are based on the stories of a Celtic leader of the fifth and sixth centuries who defended his country against Saxon invasion.

King Arthur was the son of Pendragon, and was born in Tintagel in Cornwall. The castle where he is supposed to have lived is still standing today and thousands of tourists visit it every year. Arthur was brought up by the magician Merlin and became king of Britain when he was fifteen. He proved his right to be king because he managed to pull a sword from a rock. Many others had tried but only he succeeded. He also had to fight many knights, and when he defeated them with Merlin's help, he received the magic sword *Excalibur* from the Lady of the Lake.

Arthur married Guinevere and set up his royal court in a castle at Camelot. No-one knows for sure where this place is, but it is believed to be somewhere in Great Britain. It was here that Arthur's knights sat at a round table so that they were all equal and nobody could sit at the head of the table. Many of the stories in the legend are about the adventures of the knights, among them Lancelot, Gawain and Galahad. They spent their time hunting and fighting giants and dragons. They always behaved correctly, with respect, honour and compassion.

Arthur went to Rome to fight the emperor Lucius and left his kingdom in the hands of his nephew Mordred. While he was away, Mordred took control of his kingdom and made Guinevere a prisoner. Arthur returned to fight Mordred but during the battle he was seriously wounded. He ordered the knight Belvedere to throw his sword *Excalibur* into the waters of a lake where it was caught by the hand of the Lady of the Lake and taken below the surface.
