Visitor: Hello, I wonder if you can help me? We would like to see the exhibition about Ancient Egypt. Attendant: Good morning. You will find all the Egyptian objects on the third floor of the museum. Visitor: Okay, thank you. How do we get up to the third floor? You see, I'm with my friend, who is a wheelchair user. She can't walk up the stairs. Attendant: No problem. There's a lift you can take up to the third floor. It's just round the corner from this information desk, to the right of the stairs. There's a second lift which you will find near to the shop. Visitor: That's great. Do we have to pay to see the exhibition? Attendant: No, it's all free, apart from one special exhibition in the last room on that floor. You have to pay at the desk there, if you decide you want to see it. It's a temporary exhibition about the Egyptian king, Tutankhamun. Visitor: Yes, we definitely want to see that. How much does it cost? Attendant: It's £15 per person. You just pay at the desk when you get to the exhibition. Visitor: Okay, thank you for your help. Oh, I have one more question. Is there a place where we can leave our coats and bags? Attendant: Yes, there's a cloakroom along that corridor over there, on the left, where you can leave your things. You have to pay £2 and they will give you a ticket. When you are ready to leave, just give them the ticket and they will give you your items back. Visitor: Oh, that's great. Thank you very much.

Caroline:	Why don't you write a list of all the things you need and I'll go to the supermarket for them on Saturday?
Theresa:	Good idea. When you bring the shopping to me, perhaps we could have a meal together.
Caroline:	Yes, I'd like that. Now, don't forget to write that shopping list. You can send it to me by email.

My name is Mary Rose and I'm a retired teacher. I'm nearly eighty years old. I want to tell you about my hobby, which is fossil-hunting. Fossils are what are left from animals and plants that lived millions of years ago. When I was ten, I discovered some fossils in my garden and I've been interested in them since then.

I went to university to study sciences and later got my first job teaching biology in a school in Africa. I had a wonderful time there, but came back to England after eight years.

When I finished teaching at the age of sixty, I was able to start my hobby again. Since then, I have discovered more than two thousand fossils. It's a good thing that I am still so fit and healthy, because I spend a lot of my time on my hands and knees, looking for fossils.

To help inspire young fossil-hunters of the future, I have written a book. You need to be hard-working and patient to do it well, and you must keep careful records of all the fossils you discover. I keep everything I find in a room in my house. It's like a little museum now!

Play the broadcast

Here is some advice for all you gardening enthusiasts who would like to help wildlife in hot weather. Although we're only in the spring months at the moment, it looks like we'll have another hot and dry summer this year. So, what can we do to help the birds, insects and animals that visit our gardens?

The most important thing we can do is to provide enough water. You may be lucky enough to have a pond in your garden so you simply need to keep the water level high. You can use tap water for this. If you don't have a pond, you can put a shallow dish of clean, fresh water in your garden. Put a small stone in the centre of the dish to help any insects that may fall in.

Try to provide some shelter from the sun for wildlife. You can do this by putting pieces of wood and large stones in your garden, and allowing some of the grass and other plants to grow tall to provide shade. This will be perfect for animals such as frogs and toads, insects and birds may also use it to shelter from the hot sun.
